Dear Supervisor Molina:

On behalf of the Los Angeles Area Chamber of Commerce, I write to submit our comments on the proposed redistricting maps for Los Angeles County Supervisorial Districts.

The Chamber strongly recommends the utilization of maps with the least movement necessary to comply with the principle of one person, one vote and the Voting Rights Act. We discourage wholesale changes that could shift the representation of millions in a topsy-turvy redrawing of district map. Business needs certainty, especially now. Massive changes to districts will create a great deal of insecurity for businesses already making tough decisions regarding their future.

The districts we currently have represent communities of shared interest and services. At the August 9th public hearing on the proposed maps, you heard from dozens of people representing business, non-profits and community groups, who identified with their surrounding neighborhoods and wished to continue sharing representation.

In each of these districts, dividing up the assets of a unique and diverse business environment between multiple districts would not be in the best interests of the businesses and voters in that region. It is for these reasons we strongly encourage the Board to vote for redistricting maps that result in the least upheaval to the County's business and residential communities.

Dear Supervisor Molina:

Over the past several months, Santa Ana LULAC Council #147 has taken the lead of community groups and individuals in Orange County to put its efforts in the redistricting of county supervisorial seats. Although our participation has been welcomed; we fully recognize that our input has been set aside. Quite frankly, it has been ignored by the county redistricting committee, composed of the chiefs of staff for the county supervisors. The Board of Supervisors will be holding their own public hearing later this month on the recommended plans. I bring to your attention that the recommended plans do not include LULAC's plan or any plan submitted by the public.

This is the reason Santa Ana LULAC is writing this letter of support on behalf of the Latino community in Los Angeles County, to emphasize the tremendous demographic changes of county residents as evidenced by the 2010 U.S. Census results. Between 2000 and 2010, the Latino population in Los Angeles County grew by nearly half a million residents, while the non-Latino population lost nearly 150,000 people. Latinos now make up almost half the population of Los Angeles County.

Santa Ana LULAC urges the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to draw a second Latino-majority district as required by the Voting Rights Act. As the Board is well aware, it was some twenty years ago that the County lost a Voting Rights Act lawsuit that proved the supervisors had intentionally sought to prevent the creation of a Latino district.

Although the Supervisor's Advisory Commission was presented with several proposed maps creating a second Latino-majority district, it is noted representatives appointed by Supervisors Antonovich, Knabe, and Yaroslavsky rejected each of those proposals.

Please review the history of redistricting in Los Angeles County; the county government lost a costly lawsuit the last time it tried to ignore the Federal Voting Rights Act. We ask that the Board of Supervisors does not again waste taxpayer money by triggering another successful lawsuit.
