To the Honorable Members of the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors:

My name is Aileen Getty and I join Supervisor Yaroslavsky in his opposition to Redistricting Plans T1 and S2.

I am the founder and President of Gettlove and a Member of the Board of Social Services at Blessed Sacrament -- two nonprofit organizations actively participating in Hollywood's community's coalition dedicated to securing and maintaining permanent housing for the most vulnerable homeless individuals living in our local neighborhoods.

In addition, through a combination of personal donations and loans, I have been able in collaboration with StepUpOnSecond { a provider of permanent supportive housing for the homeless who suffer from mental illness } to facilitate the acquisition and development of three buildings in Hollywood. As a result, within the coming year we will add over 70 subsidized apartment units to our community in which to house homeless neighbors.

In my endeavors and as an active partner in the United Way's Home for Good campaign to end homelessness in Los Angeles through energized local communities and effective innovative partnerships, I am especially aware that the strength required to effect meaningful change can only be found in collaborations and through relationships.

I have seen first hand both the enormous effort that is needed to create and sustain an inter-related network built around a common purpose and the remarkable on-going success that can be achieved as a result.

It is from that perspective that I share Supervisor Yaroslavsky's concern that the extreme re-shaping of District 3 in Plan T1 and S2 will significantly weaken the long established bonds, relationships and coalitions between citizens, business, government leaders, agencies and non-profits within the uniquely and historically connected communities which constitute the current District.

With the fragmentation of the District these two plans would cause, it may take many years to once again establish the vital collaborative relationships that have served the residents of District 3 so well over the years. I fear the damage done could be irreparable.

Like the Supervisor, I am also a strong supporter of the principle that our government bodies should be truly representative. I have confidence and optimism that a fair plan can still be developed that will serve the goal of representative government while assuring any geographic adjustments to District 3 will not destroy the strength and effectiveness its communities experience as a result of their decades long cohesion.

Estimados Supervisores:

Hoy les escribo con una gran preocupación sobre los planes bajo consideración de redistribuir los distritos y que afectarían las líneas límites de cada distrito del Condado de Los Angeles. Los resultados del Censo 2010 muestran la existencia de por lo menos dos nuevas comunidades Latinas, las cuales la mitad están en edad de votar. En otras palabras, ahora es posible la creación de dos o más distritos supervisoriales con la mayoría Latina y manteniendo un distrito competitivo Afroamericano.

Como usted sabe, el Comité de Revisión de Límites del Condado de Los Angeles es responsable de determinar las fronteras de los cinco distritos. Aunque se han sometido varias propuestas dignas de consideración, yo deseo expresar mi apoyo por el Plan Enmendado S-1, también conocido como la Coalición Latino/Afroamericano, que crearía dos nuevos distritos supervisoriales compuestos con una mayoría Latina y que serían geográficamente compactos.

El Plan Enmendado S-1 tiene todos los requisitos bajo la ley. Y también tiene otra obligación igual de importante— el de honestamente tratar la historia del Condado de Los Angeles y su discriminación racial a la hora de votar. El Plan Enmendado S-1 tiene el apoyo de organizaciones más allá de la comunidad Latina.

La verdad poco agradable pero incontrovertible es que el voto en el Condado de Los Angeles se ha polarizado históricamente a lo largo de las líneas étnicas, principalmente entre Latinos contra los no latinos. Esto fue verdad en 1991, cuando las líneas de los distritos del Condado fueron dibujadas de nuevo para permitir que hubiera justa representación para los Latinos—esto fue sólo porque la Corte Suprema de los Estados Unidos forzó la mano del condado como resultado del caso *Garza contra el Condado de Los Angeles* que obstinadamente escribió crónicas institucionalizando el racismo perpetuado por generaciones contra los Latinos del condado.

Ahora en el 2011, los Latinos representan la mayoría de los ciudadanos que están en edad de votar. Un informe co-dirigido por David I. Lublin y Gary Segura titulado "Una Evaluación del Impacto Electoral y Conductual de la Mayoría-Minoría en los Distritos" demuestra científicamente que muchos Latinos han conocido anecdóticamente por generaciones-que la votación en el Condado de Los Angeles todavía se polariza entre las líneas étnicas, particularmente entre Latinos y no-latinos. Para ponerlo en claro, la discriminación racial a la hora de votar no es cosa del pasado.

Estos hechos demuestran la necesidad actual de tener por lo menos dos distritos supervisoriales con la mayoría Latina. De hecho, yo creo que esta necesidad incumplida los priva de sus derechos-qué es exactamente lo contrario de la misión que tiene el Comité de Revisión de Límites. No es una exageración decir que los residentes del Condado confían que el comité asegurará que no los priven de sus derechos.

Esto es exactamente lo que pasó cuando el comité no apoyó el Plan Enmendado S-1. Este resultado es particularmente verdad si tomamos en cuenta el bajo estatus económico de los Latinos y lo combinamos con la infame decisión monumental de la Corte Suprema de los Estados Unidos *Citizens United vs. Federal Election Commission* en el 2010 que permitieron que los candidatos recibieran cantidades ilimitadas en fondos políticos e independientes por corporaciones en las elecciones.

Como tal, porque el Plan Enmendado S-1 cumpliría no sólo con la letra pero también con el espíritu de la misión del Comité de Revisión de Límites, yo les pido que adopten este plan. Muchas gracias por haber leído mi carta y por considerar mi mensaje. Por favor comuníquese conmigo en el futuro si necesario.

We firmly OPPOSE the adoption of plans S2 and T1.

For the last decade, since the last redistricting, our small neighborhood has been part of the County Supervisorial District 3. We have appreciated being included with all the communities associated with the Santa Monica Mountains which have compatible concerns and interests. We have found this district to be unusually harmonious, cohesive and coherent, and it should be preserved.

Unfortunately and despite a transparent process conducted by the Boundary Review Committee, two plans (S2 and T1) have been submitted that ignore the conclusions from the former very democratic and open debate. Views expressed by the Oaks Homeowners Association and hundreds of others are being summarily tossed aside. This is intolerable and completely undemocratic. As a LA County Commissioner, my concerns center on the years of relationships developed with facilities and officeholders who trust that those relationships result in efficiencies and positive change. No matter what Commission, wholesale change in moving 3.375 million (S2) or 3.5 million (T-1) constituents into politically aligned districts threatens to undo much work done at the Commission level, splits cities, and creates a need to spend years again fostering new relationships with different constituents. In addition, one proposal has the incumbent covering over 60 miles across the District transversing heavy traffic at all hours of the day. Is this punishment?

A moderate change to address population shifts and district balance is inevitable. Moving 277K constituents makes sense along these lines. Supervisors who have familiarity with local issues results in progress. We have items before our Commission that are near completion with current support. I suspect other Commissions may be similar in nature. Having to stop, and re-educate, is not constructive when deadlines on available dollars are on the line. Let's be sensible about this.

This letter is the second from the Los Feliz Improvement Association to address the County redistricting process. The initial letter was sent to the Boundary Review Committee and addressed issues which have not changed. In particular it argued against separating the Los Feliz neighborhood from those to our west with very similar geographic, demographic, and socio-cultural concerns.

Los Feliz is renowned as an historic district in Los Angeles with well defined boundaries and concerns. SurveyLA, a recent mapping of distinct Los Angeles neighborhoods by the Los Angeles Times, has correctly described its boundaries which coincide with those of the Los Feliz Improvement Association, an organization that has represented thousands of Los Feliz residents for nearly 100 years. Our neighborhood has also been intimately associated with Griffith Park lands for over 200 years, and we have assumed the primary citizen responsibility for the park's stewardship for most of the park's existence.

We have appreciated being included with all the communities associated with the Santa Monica Mountains which have compatible concerns and interests. We have found this district to be unusually harmonious, cohesive and coherent, and it should be preserved.

Unfortunately and despite a transparent process conducted by the Boundary Review Committee, two plans (S2 and T1) have been submitted that ignore the conclusions from the former very democratic and open debate. 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

I and many members of my residential community (90049 is my home zip code) urge you to leave the existing districting structure undisturbed for the following reasons:

- The Voting Rights Act is a cornerstone of our democracy, which requires that we protect the voting rights of minorities. This can be accomplished without dismembering established communities of interest.**
- Plans T1 and S2 would each move nearly 3.5 million people from one supervisorial district to another, destroying established relationships and seriously setting back progress on important community issues.**
- The Third District unites three adjacent, interlocking communities of interest: the greater Westside, the San Fernando Valley and the Las Virgenes region, all of them bound together by the Santa Monica Mountain range. This region is topographically, geographically, economically and socially cohesive and compact. It should be kept together.**

The two proposed plans would adversely impact the tremendous strides we've made in a variety of important areas, listed below. Again, please feel free to share your views on any of these issues.

Dividing communities

Plans T1 and S2 would divide the San Fernando Valley into three supervisorial districts instead of two at present. This would be a serious setback for the Valley, which has fought hard to maintain its own identity.

Mass transit

Plans T1 and S2 could undermine the progress our region has made towards rapid transit and could threaten our ability to expeditiously complete the subway to the Westside and the Exposition Light Rail to Santa Monica.

Homelessness

Plans T1 and S2 threaten to reverse the pioneering and highly effective work we've done to combat homelessness in Hollywood, the Westside and the San Fernando Valley through permanent supportive housing

Health care for the uninsured

Plans T1 and S2 could undermine the network of public-private partnership clinics now serving the Valley, Hollywood and the Westside, potentially compromising health care access for thousands of uninsured residents.

The environment

The Third District includes some of the county's greatest environmental and recreational resources, including Griffith Park and the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area. Because of the district's beautiful natural setting, its residents share an interest in resolving environmental problems. Keeping the mountains in a district that is compact and environmentally conscious will help ensure political leadership that is sensitive to these issues.

Social services

Plan T1 could easily disrupt social services networks. These networks include both public and private non-profit agencies that provide such wide-ranging services as mental health assistance, family preservation, CalFresh (formerly food stamps) and legal services for the poor. Plans T1 and S2 could quickly dismantle these partnerships, causing some of our most vulnerable residents to fall through holes in the safety net.

Juvenile Probation

Plan T1 would remove three juvenile probation camps from the Third District, threatening the progress we've made in improving outcomes for incarcerated youth.

Emergency preparedness

The Third District, as home to the entire Santa Monica Mountains range, is no stranger to natural disasters. Our communities have made huge strides in learning from, preparing for and guarding against wildfires, floods and other emergency conditions. Keeping the Santa Monica Mountains as the centerpiece of a compact district would help ensure political leadership that is sensitive to these issues.

Rivers and watersheds

The Third District includes a large portion of the L.A. River Watershed (in the Valley) and the North Santa Monica Bay Watershed. Keeping these together in one compact, environmentally conscious district would help ensure political leadership that understands the need to resolve watershed issues countywide.

Dear Officials:

After careful review of the proposed redistricting maps I've decided that the plan that would most benefit my household is **the A3 map**. As a long time resident of the San Fernando Valley this plan would enable many proposed projects, or those already underway, to be carried out.

The two redistricting plans, known as S2 and T1, that have been offered, would move nearly 40% of the County's population from one District to another, and in so doing radically change the boundaries of our Third District. This will definitely affect the quality of our representation and could jeopardize the tremendous progress we've made in transportation, homelessness, land use and many other issues for SFV. Proponents of these plans say they're needed to comply with the Federal Voting Rights Act, but the Federal Courts say that's not the case in regions where non-minority voters regularly "cross over" to support minority-favored candidates – as we've experienced here with the elections of such Latino leaders as Antonio Villaraigosa and Sheriff Lee Baca.

Dividing us would radically redraw the Board of Supervisors' district boundaries, leaving communities fragmented and an estimated 3.5 million people suddenly represented by a supervisor for whom they never cast a vote. Worse, some of these same people would be denied the right to vote for a supervisor for as long as six years because of the timing of elections. The scope of the fallout would be vast and swift, potentially undermining the ability of communities to speak with one voice as advocates for their common interests. For example, the San Fernando Valley, which has fought hard to maintain its own identity, would be carved into three different districts. Hollywood and mid-Wilshire, meanwhile, could be included in a district with such distant cities as Lomita and Cerritos.

Redistricting would also significantly injure our ability to fight together to improve transportation in our communities, keep a close watch on development issues, extend health care to our underserved population and protect the environment of the Santa Monica Mountains and the north Santa Monica Bay. Both of the proposed maps/plans create two districts in which Latinos would comprise more than half the voting-age citizens, instead of one such district now. But contrary to the arguments put forward by supporters of the proposed maps, their adoption is not required by this law. The Voting Rights Act requires an equal opportunity for minority groups; it does not require the creation of districts in which a single minority group comprises more than 50% of the voting age citizenry. The Federal courts have ruled that "fifty percent" districts are only required when voting is so racially polarized that non-minorities consistently vote against minority-preferred candidates to such an extent that those candidates are denied an equal opportunity to win.

The notion that non-minorities won't vote for a minority candidate in L.A. County is antiquated. Los Angeles in 2011 is not the same as the Los Angeles of forty, thirty or even twenty years ago. Our county is politically and socially far more mature and broad-minded. In the last decade, many elections have been won by Latino candidates even where Latinos did not represent a majority of the voters. These candidates include Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa, Sheriff Lee Baca and County Assessor John Noguez.

It is possible to redistrict this county in a manner that protects the voting rights of minorities without dismembering established communities of interest, without shifting nearly 40% of our population from one district to another, and without relying on antiquated assumptions about the voting behavior of different segments of the electorate. The federal courts have given us the roadmap to get this done, and have consistently rejected efforts to use the Voting Rights Act in the way the backers of these new plans propose.

Please vote for what is best for our PRESENT TODAY and what "WE THE PEOPLE" want which is a Yes Vote on Map A3!

My name is Joseph Rosendo and I am a resident of District 3 and currently Zeb Yaroslavsky is my representative. He should be – I voted for him. But if T1 and S2 are passed as the new redistricting plans we will lose Zeb and we will lose a lot of the rights that we have fought so very hard for and the way of life that we have preserved for all Angelenos in Topanga.

I am writing in opposition to the proposed redistricting as shown online on the maps (denoted as T1 and S2) that were submitted as part of the redistricting plan and that would radically redraw the Board of Supervisors' district boundaries, leaving communities separated and an estimated 3.5 million people suddenly represented by a supervisor for whom they never cast a vote. The two horrendous proposals are basing their redistricting ideas on the premise that they are supporting will of the Voting Rights Bill in order to give minorities an equal right to representation.

The idea that non-minorities won't vote for a minority candidate in L.A. County is false. The winning election campaigns of Latino candidates even where Latinos did not represent a majority of the voters such as the election of Mayor Antonio Villaraigosa, Sheriff Lee Baca and County Assessor John Noguez is proof enough. And, no group of residents is more sensitive to the issues of Voting Rights than the people of Topanga. We have historically been a community that has stood up and fought for the rights of all people. We believe that the supervisors can meet all the requirements of the federal Voting Rights Act without dramatically dividing cities and communities of interest, as two of the proposed plans would do.

We need to keep our current District 3 as geographically and sensibly unified as possible. The challenges we face here are nothing like those in the South Bay or other areas of the county as with whom we would be paired in the proposed redistricting. We are largely a rural district and our concerns with public safety, for example, are vastly different in this northern mountain portion of the county than the Beach Cities, Hawthorne, Torrance, etc. The new districts would be inefficient as well. We're going to be fighting now for resources against other areas that we need not be, simply because there is no common interest. What Torrance needs for urban public safety, for example, is far different than how the current district responds. I think the proposed redistricts will result in confusion, chaos, inefficient use of funds, and unnecessary bickering between municipalities that isn't even necessary. A supervisor will be put in the role of deciding winners and losers when a more cohesive approach would avoid this. Environmentally, there are similar concerns.

Although I would prefer that things stay as they are, I, at the very least, urge you to support the plan and suggestions put forth by Supervisor Yaroslavsky and keep District 3 together as much as possible by supporting A3. I will see you all on Tuesday morning. I pray that you do the right thing.

Dear Supervisors:

I am writing on behalf of Bel Air Skycrest Property Owners' Association (BASPOA) in regards to the once-in-a-decade County re-districting process currently playing out. BASPOA members have deep concerns about the way in which proposed redistricting plans T1 & S2 divide the topographically, geographically, economically and socially distinct region that is the current Third Supervisorial District.

We are particularly concerned about the arbitrary compartmentalizing of what we consider to be our primary community of interest, the Santa Monica Mountains, a swath of wilderness running through the heart of this great city. These mountains, with their still surviving areas of open space and rugged parklands; their wildlife corridors; their ever-developing network of trails; their astonishing city views; their rustic roads, including the 55-mile Mulholland Scenic Parkway; and their sometimes palatial, sometimes rustic hillside neighborhoods; their designated historic and cultural monuments, including the Hollywood Sign and Griffith Observatory, are precious and irreplaceable resources that belong to all the people of Los Angeles.

In fact, these mountains are a focal point for a larger community of interest that extends well beyond the actual hill dwellers like ourselves, beyond even the city of Los Angeles. The Santa Monica Mountains provide environmental, recreational, residential and tourism attractions that are unique in the world. People come from all over to drive, walk, hike and bike through these mountains. But the mountains are also extremely vulnerable to degradation by forces both natural and manmade, prone to wildfires and landslides and commercial overdevelopment, overburdened by the hordes of daily commuters traveling their transportation corridors.

Public safety, transportation, recreation, conservation and intelligent growth are universal issues. But specific kinds of challenges and problems related to these issues vary dramatically from one urban area to another, and dealing with them requires quite different kinds of knowledge, expertise and resource allocation. Consider public safety. People often say that there are no seasons in Los Angeles. But it only takes a couple of years in L.A. to know that the Santa Monica Mountains have two very definite seasons—fire season and landslide season. In fact, the entire Santa Monica Mountain range is categorized as an “extremely high risk fire area”—and after the fires come the rains to flood our inadequately designed infrastructure and wash away the newly destabilized soil. It therefore makes excellent sense, in terms of preventative strategies and also in terms of emergency response during (and after) actual times of crisis, that this entire hillside/mountain area should be kept in a single supervisorial district.

Consider the special needs involved in stewarding the open space and parklands. Griffith Park

has been designated one of 34 "biodiversity hotspots" in the world. Its 4,310-acre expanse at the far eastern end of the Santa Monicas range is the largest natural wilderness area within any city in the nation. These mountains are of a piece, a single complex but interconnected living organism in terms of wildlife and native flora habitats and also in terms of trail connectivity, maintenance issues and park services. And Griffith Park is the crown jewel of them all. Therefore this entire hillside/mountain area should be kept in a single supervisorial district.

Proposed redistricting plans T1 and S2 would be a disaster for these mountains and for all who live in and enjoy recreational and cultural use of them. Do not dilute our representation. Do not undermine or disrupt the many County programs that currently serve us so well. Public safety depends on it – that of local residents, daily commuters, recreational and cultural users, and many, many others, including the 4,000-plus students and staff who spend their days on the Mulholland Institutional Corridor.

BASPOA residents already live in a community of interest inappropriately divided among City Council districts, so we know from painful experience how counterproductive that kind of bureaucratic division of labor can be in terms of effective governance. Please don't subject us to more of the same on the County level. County services are absolutely vital to our well-being, safety and quality of life here in the Santa Monica Mountains. We urge you to ensure the ongoing ability of citizens and politicians to work together to protect and preserve this very important part of Los Angeles. Reject T1 and S2 and **SUPPORT A3**, as the plan which most nearly preserves the present Third District boundary lines and ***the only plan which keeps the Santa Monica Mountains intact, in one supervisorial district, from Griffith Park to the Ventura County line.***

If it's not broke don't fix it.



Dear Los Angeles County Supervisors:

My name is Pat Mac Neil, a co-founder and president of the Topanga Coalition for Emergency Preparedness (T-CEP). The devastating 1993 Old Topanga/Malibu fire killed 3 people, burned over 400 structures, and 16,000 acres before it was stopped. It only took 2.5 hours for it to get from the top of Topanga to the beach, yet we could not find out what was in its path, where it was going, who needed to evacuate, there was no plan residents could follow...much less practice. We formed T-CEP to fill that terrifying communication gap and currently have over 250 volunteers who man our hotline when our EOC is activated and help provide verifiable information to our residents so they can be prepared to take necessary steps and evacuate from danger, who work year-around to educate and prepare our community for the inevitable disaster.

The Los Angeles County Strategic Plan for the Unincorporated Areas of the County adopted by your honorable Board some years back, put forth several models that customized delivering county municipal services to meet the needs of the 100's of distinct communities making up the vast and diverse unincorporated areas of the County. Mountain and canyon communities like Topanga, are an example of a rural community, an "exurb" in the middle of a huge, wildland urban interface.

The strategic plan participants overwhelmingly chose Topanga as the community to develop a community-based Emergency Management Plan for the County, a template other at-risk communities could use to help develop their own preparedness plans and strategies.

For the next two years, under the guidance and coordination provided by the Third District, the ad hoc Topanga Emergency Management Planning Steering Committee, embarked on a joint community-agency-government effort that brought together all County first responders --- OEM, Fire, Forestry, Sheriff, Animal Care and Control, DPW, CAO/CEO, with CHP, Caltrans, LAUSD, Red Cross --- with local stakeholders - T-CEP, Arson Watch, CERT, ERT, DRT, Neighborhood Networks, Chamber of Commerce, the Topanga Town Council. At the end of 2 intense years of collaboration, in 2005 the Topanga Survival Guide was printed and mailed to

every resident in Topanga. This Preparedness Guide paved the way for subsequent emergency information dealing with other aspects of Preparedness --- Prevention, Pets, the elderly, the homebound, Recovery!

In 2009, your honorable Board adopted a resolution creating the Topanga Emergency Management Task Force which is co-chaired by the County's Office of Emergency Management and T-CEP, and whose members are drawn from all the critical government, agency, and community stakeholder groups and organizations who MUST work together to prepare for, respond to, and recover from the next inevitable disaster.

Our planning and implementation efforts are watched by many, and communities inside and outside the County, all the way to Missouri have contacted us over the years, and continue to do so, to learn how they can also adapt community-based planning into their local disaster preparedness networks. The County modeled the Topanga Survival Guide for a general county guide which has been published in several different languages. L.A. City homeowner associations and Neighborhood Councils have utilized the Third District model, as well.

We do not want to see this longstanding critical partnership put at risk: The need to prepare for disaster never goes away; complacency is not an option. Success in continuing to manage our preparedness efforts in this wildland interface known as the Santa Monica Mountains, requires collaboration to be a very high priority for a Supervisor who understands the extreme and unique challenges of disaster planning faced in the Third District. We appreciate the support of the County, but most especially the commitment of our Third District Supervisor Zev Yaroslavsky to make emergency preparedness one of the foremost priorities for the County of Los Angeles. We therefore urge you to adopt a redistricting map, like A3, that will respect the cohesive and connected nature of the Third District, and not suddenly reassign over 1 million people, including Topanga, into a District with little knowledge of the specific challenges we face preparing for the next disaster and helping our fellow county citizens to survive.

My name is Ric Loya.

I'm a 40-year resident of Huntington Park (District 1) and a former Huntington Park mayor and councilmember. I also was a health teacher at Huntington Park High School for almost 30 years. BUT I was born and raised in Long Beach (District 4) and my wife was from Glendale (District 5).

I am here to urge the Los Angeles County Board of Supervisors to adopt either the T1 Map or the S2 Map. These maps would support the creation of two Latino-opportunity districts – not a Latino supervisor, just the fair opportunity to elect one.

Fairness at the ballot box is not the same as a predetermined outcome at the ballot box. Latinos, like everyone else, understand and respect this fact.

Remember – in the 1980s, Huntington Park was the Latino-majority city that kept electing Anglo council members and when I was on Council even I ran WITH incumbent Tom Jackson (we both won but at least I received more votes). Another time I met

with a group of Latino hotheads and told them I could only support the best candidate in an election coming up in our Latino city AND if that best candidate was Asian or Black they would have my support.

I am really trying to emphasize that we are talking about opportunity here and not absolutes for Latinos. I recall when in Huntington Park here was our chance. So we had a panel of Latino police chiefs interview candidates. We had a community panel interview candidates. AND then there was our council – talk about a stacked deck. ALL three panels selected the Anglo candidate and the Council appointed one Randy Narramore as our Chief – that ain't a Spanish surname!we were looking for a police chief. We wanted a Latino.

More recently the Latino majority in Bell elected a city council with only three Latinos AND that council just appointed an Anglo interim city manager from Northern California. So much for Latinos only supporting Latinos.

But Latinos in Los Angeles County tend to have many overlapping interests and similar experiences.

Take the environment – a subject I've amassed a great deal of experience with our infamous La Montana, a proposed power

plant in Vernon, and a hazardous waste treatment plant across the street from Huntington Park High.

A family from Walnut Park or Huntington Park is going to live in a densely-populated, urban, semi-industrial neighborhood a lot like that family in San Fernando.

Both families need more parks, more open space – and more opportunities to explore within and outside of Los Angeles County. Both families face the very similar challenges to attaining them.

And both families deserve the opportunity to elect more advocates to this Board of Supervisors to help them meet those challenges!

In closing, as you consider which redistricted map to choose, I urge you very strongly to keep unified what is known as “Southeast” Los Angeles – namely: Huntington Park, Walnut Park, South Gate, Maywood, Vernon, Cudahy, and Bell.

These communities all were part of the original Rancho San Antonio (see attached map). Infact, we still have the San Antonio Regional Library, San Antonio Elementary School, and there is even talk of a new San Antonio Charter High School District (see


attached map). And we used to have the San Antonio Health Center.



We are citizens of Malibu and writing to support the A3 plan and to oppose the S2 and T1 plans.

The only way we can have a voice in the county is if we are grouped together with other communities of similar interest. There is demonstrated experience that communities in our current District 3 are working well together to deal with issues of the environment, water quality and transportation. Our respective council members have developed important working relationships with each other and our communities share common needs and priorities not shared by the communities we would be grouped with in the S2 and T1 plans.

Re: BRC's Second Letter On Third Supervisorial District Boundaries

Dear Supervisors:

The Brentwood Residents Coalition (“BRC”)¹ joins with constituents in the Third Supervisorial District in support of Redistricting Plan A3, which would keep current boundaries largely intact. In our letter to the Boundary Review Committee, dated May 23, 2011, we stated our strong support for the existing boundaries of the Third Supervisorial District. In doing so, we asked that the three key communities of interest that form the current Third District—the greater Westside, the Santa Monica Mountains (stretching from Griffith Park in the east to the Las Virgenes region in the west), and the San Fernando Valley—be maintained as a single community within the District.

The Boundary Review Committee recognized the importance of maintaining this community of interest by recommending that it be maintained largely intact. Unfortunately, two plans submitted after the Boundary Review Committee completed its open and transparent review process, Plans S2 and T1, ignore the views expressed by our organization and the hundreds of others who were represented in the public process. We now write to reemphasize the importance of maintaining the existing Third District’s community of interest and our very strong opposition to the S2 and T1 proposals that would sever it. The District’s longstanding boundaries share unifying transportation-related, environmental, hillside, safety and recreational interests. Residents have benefited from having these common interests represented by a single County Supervisor and would suffer if this commonality were diluted by severely altering the existing boundaries, as proposed under S2 and T1.

¹ The BRC is a grass roots, non-profit advocacy group whose purposes are to preserve and enhance the environment and quality of life in Brentwood, to protect the integrity of residential neighborhoods, to assist with planning, to uphold zoning and municipal codes, to encourage traffic safety, and to educate the public on issues that affect quality of life and the environment.

BRENTWOOD RESIDENTS COALITION

The Boundary Review Committee was established by the Board of Supervisors to take public input and craft a thoroughly vetted plan that would then be recommended to the Board of Supervisors. The recommendation of the Committee both incorporated this public input and adhered to the admonition of state and federal laws to consider a variety of factors, including compliance with the federal Voting Rights Act, and drawing compact and cohesive districts that keep communities of interest together. And the Committee's proposed map, A2, has been slightly revised in A3 to improve upon the original A2 map.

First, and in stark contrast to the Committee's recommendations, which were fully vetted through the extensive public process, the eleventh hour S2 and T1 proposals would create widespread voter confusion by suddenly displacing 3.3 and 3.5 million people, respectively, into a different district—causing them to live under a Supervisor for whom they never had a chance to cast a ballot. Over 1 million of those individuals would also live in a place where no Supervisorial election would have been held for a total of six years, thereby exacerbating the disenfranchisement of voters in Los Angeles County.

Second, Plans S2 and T1 would cleave the Santa Monica Mountains in two—dividing the Mulholland Scenic Corridor, splitting its interwoven trail and open space network, and denying Mountain residents a unified voice on many shared public policy issues. Preserving this community of interest was a major theme of our May 23, 2011 letter. The length of the District follows the backbone of the Santa Monica Mountains between the Hollywood Hills and the Pacific Ocean. The width of the District encompasses both the north and south sides of the Mountains, including watershed areas. This wide swath of the Santa Monica Mountains and watershed areas includes Malibu, Las Virgenes, Topanga, Agoura Hills, Calabasas, Tarzana, Woodland Hills, Encino, Sherman Oaks, Studio City, and Griffith Park, on the north side of the Santa Monica Mountains, and Pacific Palisades, Santa Monica, Brentwood, West Los Angeles, Bel Air, Beverly Hills, the Hollywood Hills, and Hollywood on the south side.

This Santa Monica Mountains Range and watershed community of interest requires leadership that combines an appreciation and respect for the natural hillside environment and the recreational opportunities it offers to area residents and the general public. We in the District have unique concerns, interests and experiences related to the preservation and public acquisition of open space, environmental and watershed protection, hillside planning and development controls, fire and flood safety, wildlife habitat and connectivity, and public recreational opportunities. We need unified leadership within a single Supervisorial District to effectively represent our common interests and concerns.

The Santa Monica Mountains Range, stretching from Griffith Park in the east to the Las Virgenes/Conejo region in the west, encompasses communities that share unique Santa Monica Mountains interests and concerns. These include:

- The need for close coordination of government efforts related to disaster preparedness, recovery, and response. (See BRC letter, May 23, 2011)

BRENTWOOD RESIDENTS COALITION

- The need to coordinate activities to protect the health of watersheds, both through policies that reduce polluted runoff in urban areas, and by acquiring open space that can be used to preserve watersheds in their natural state and reduce pollution downstream.
- The need to protect the transportation links between the greater Westside, Hollywood, and the San Fernando Valley. The roads and freeways that run through the passes and canyons of the Santa Monica Mountains form a key portion of the region's transportation network. It is vital that these key arteries remain in a unified supervisorial district so that adequate planning and funding for road improvements from the Sepulveda Pass to, and including, the Cahuenga Pass can be sought at Metro and other state and regional transportation entities.

Plans T1 and S2, however, would sever the eastern portion of the Santa Monica Mountains, making it less likely that the entirety of the Santa Monica Mountains would receive the same level of advocacy on each of these policy issues. In particular, Plans T1 and S2 would destroy this unity by dividing the Mountains at the Cahuenga Pass, thereby dividing the eastern Santa Monica Mountains from its western extension. As a result, Griffith Park and its surrounding communities would be separated from the rest of the Santa Monica Mountains.

The importance of maintaining the actual Santa Monica Mountains Range boundary – between Griffith Park and Las Virgenes/Conejo – has been recognized as essential by the Legislature in establishing the Santa Monica Mountains Conservancy. This boundary was designed to ensure that the Conservancy not stop at either the boundaries of the Santa Monica Mountains National Recreation Area, the western border of the City of Los Angeles, or any other **artificial boundary** because the concerns of the Santa Monica Mountains—preservation of open space, development of trail networks that would be accessible to millions of Angelenos, fire protection, and maintenance of wildlife corridors, view sheds and air sheds—do not recognize such man-made distinctions. The continued success of these Santa Monica Mountains endeavors demands unified representation. This representation is enhanced when a single Supervisorial District encompasses the entire Range so as to facilitate coordination of local, state, private and federal resources. Plans T1 and S2 fail to keep the Santa Monica Mountains unified in this manner.

The Brentwood Residents Coalition is a member of the Federation of Hillside and Canyon Associations, which was formed in 1952. The Federation has naturally organized along the Santa Monica Mountains geographic lines for decades, representing both the eastern and western portions of the Santa Monica Mountains within the City of Los Angeles and its environs. Plans T1 and S2 would divide the Hillside Federation, isolating some of the neighborhood associations it represents, including the Los Feliz Improvement Association, Franklin Hills Residents Association, Hollywood Dell Civic Association and Hollywoodland Homeowners Association. This artificial boundary would diminish our established community of interest.

BRENTWOOD RESIDENTS COALITION

Dilution of the Santa Monica Mountains community of interest through Plans T1 and S2 would impair the traditions of leadership and vision that have characterized the Third District. The BRC therefore asks that the Supervisors reject Plans T1 and S2 and approve Plan A3, substantially preserving the existing boundaries of the Third County Supervisorial District.

Dear Supervisors:

Canyon Back Alliance (“CBA”) is dedicated to preserving public access to recreational trails in the Santa Monica Mountains. We are writing in support of Redistricting Plan A3 because it alone would preserve the Santa Monica Mountains community of interest within a single Supervisorial District. The recently-proposed alternatives, Plans T1 and S2, impair the community of interest by severing the Santa Monica Mountains along artificial lines. Doing so would undermine this long-established Santa Monica Mountains community of interest.

Redistricting Plan A3, however, would largely preserve the current boundaries of the Third District, which follow the spine of the Santa Monica Mountains between Griffith Park to the east and Las Virgenes to the west, encompassing Malibu, Las Virgenes, Topanga, Agoura Hills, Calabasas, Tarzana, Woodland Hills, Encino, Sherman Oaks, Studio City, and Griffith Park, on the north side of the Santa Monica Mountains, and Pacific Palisades, Santa Monica, Brentwood, West Los Angeles, Bel Air, Beverly Hills, the Hollywood Hills, and Hollywood on the south side. These boundaries define a significant community of interest that should be protected against fragmentation through redistricting.

The Santa Monica Mountains are a unique and defining scenic, environmental and recreational resource for the County. Recreational trails and the open space through which they run must not only be preserved and maintained, but also expanded through trail connectivity projects and the acquisition of open space. The importance of unified County representation for the entire Santa Monica Mountains is critical for achieving these goals. The CBA has worked for the past seven years with residents, elected public officials, and organizations located within these boundaries for the preservation of public access to trails in and along the Santa Monica Mountains and

for the acquisition of open space to improve trail connectivity and enhance the unique aesthetic and environmental treasure that is the Santa Monica Mountains. In doing so, we have received invaluable leadership and support from the current Third District Supervisor, whose expertise in issues related to the Mountains has been crucial.

The natural boundary that is the Santa Monica Mountains is geographically self-evident.



The wildlife that pass through our backyards on the western side of the Mountains likewise share our neighbors' backyards on the eastern side. This common experience leads to a community of interest that encompasses wildlife protection within the Mountains. The risk of wildfire poses an equal threat to all in or along the Mountain areas, whether east, west, north or south. Residents and trail users within the Santa Monica Mountains area thereby have a common concern for fire safety and protection. And, as hillside residents and recreational trail users on all sides of the Santa Monica Mountains, we are concerned about hillside stability and flood protection.

But Redistricting Plans T1 and S2, unlike Plan A3, would abruptly sever the eastern portion of the Santa Monica Mountains along wholly artificial boundaries. The impact of this artificial division would be to split representation over a "piece" of the Santa Monica Mountains by placing it within a District where the significance of common and often complex Mountains-related issues do not loom so large with the vast majority of constituents who reside outside the Santa Monica Mountains.

The likely result of dividing the Santa Monica Mountains community of interest by carving it into eastern and western sections would be the dilution of the community of interest. Redistricting is not supposed to sacrifice established communities of interest. 

My name is Joseph Rosendo and I am a resident of District 3 and currently Zev Yaroslavsky is my representative. I am pleased that he is for many reasons, one being that I voted for him. If T1 and S2 are passed as the new redistricting plans we will lose Zev and we will lose a lot of the rights for all Angelenos that we have fought so very hard for in Topanga.

I am writing in opposition to the proposed redistricting maps (denoted as T1 and S2) that were submitted as part of the redistricting plan and that would radically redraw the Board of Supervisors' district boundaries, leaving communities separated and an estimated 3.5 million people suddenly represented by a supervisor for whom they never cast a vote. My opposition to the two proposals is based on their redistricting based on the premise that they are supporting the will of the Voting Rights Bill in order to give minorities an equal right to representation.

The idea that non-minorities won't vote for a minority candidate in L.A. County is false. We believe that the supervisors can meet all the requirements of the federal Voting Rights Act without dramatically dividing cities and communities of interest, as two of the proposed plans would do.

We need to keep our current District 3 as geographically and sensibly unified as possible. The challenges we face here are nothing like those in the South Bay or other areas of the county with whom we would be paired in the proposed redistricting. We are largely a rural district and our concerns with public safety, for example, are vastly different in this northern mountain portion of the county than the Beach Cities, Hawthorne, Torrance, etc. The new districts would be inefficient as well. We are unnecessarily going to be fighting for resources against other areas, simply because there is no common interest. Torrance's needs for urban public safety, for example, are far different from the needs of the communities that now make up District Three. I think the two proposals - T1 and S2 - will result in confusion, chaos, inefficient use of funds and unnecessary bickering between municipalities that isn't necessary. The supervisor will be placed in the position of deciding winners and losers when a more cohesive approach would avoid this. There are environmental and fire safety concerns as well.

I therefore urge you to support the plan and suggestions put forth by Supervisor Zev Yaroslavsky and keep District 3 together as much as possible by supporting Redistricting Plan A3.

Honorable Supervisors,

Thank you for allowing me to write to you, and hopefully speak to you on Tuesday.

First of all, I want to point out that people in each District think their Supervisor does a fine job and each wants his/her district to remain similar to what it is now. Please also consider that the unincorporated areas will be hit the hardest with aggressive redistricting since they do not have a city government to see them through the years of transition it will take to get acquainted with a new Supervisor and staff.

That being said, I appeal to each of you to read ***all*** the plans thoroughly with open minds. As I understand it, the A3 Plan is not acceptable because the Latino/Hispanic population needs to be represented by a majority of the voters in 2 districts. Look closely and you will see that **Latinos are the largest group of voting age residents, not in 2, but 3 of the five districts in the A3 Plan.**

Here are the figures for the Latino/Hispanic residents in the **A3 Plan** to back this up:

Total population: District 1=72.1%, District 2=54.6%, and District 4=43.3%.

Voting Age Majority population:

District 1=67.7%, District 2=49.8%, and District 4=38.7%.

In each of the above 3 districts, the Latino/Hispanic group is dominant, having more than any other group in the A3 Plan.

The S2 and T1 Plans, form 2 “super-majority” Latino/Hispanic districts, and 1 “majority” district. This situation was not the intent of the Fair Voting Act. The Act was written to make it possible for minorities to have a *fair* chance of being elected. That is actually what the A3 Plan does. It gives Latinos a leg up in being fairly represented in local elections. In contrast, what is being accomplished with the S2 and T1 plans is that it makes sure that no group, other than Latinos, have any chance for their candidates to be elected.

Here are the figures for the Latino/Hispanic majorities in the **S2 Plan**:

Total Population: District 1=69%, District 2=54% District 4=62%

Voting Age Majority Population:

District 1=64%, District 2=50%, District 4=58%

Here are the figures for the Latino/Hispanic majorities in the **T1 Plan**:

Total Population: District 1=67%, District 2=52.5%, District 3=68.4%

Voting Age Majority Population:

District 1=63%, District 2=48%, District 3=63%

Some supervisors say that having the most in a single ethnic group in any district paves the way for that group to have a better chance of being able to elect its candidate. I

disagree because I believe that fair minded people would elect the best leaders due to experience, interest in *all* ethnic group problems, etc. But that does not seem to be what is most important here today. If we could eliminate super-majorities, it would be possible for voters in each district to elect the best candidate, not just a candidate with a particular surname or skin color.

The A3 Plan is the most balanced plan, best for both incorporated and unincorporated communities, and meets the criteria of 2 dominate Latino voter districts. The S2 and T1 Plans are unreasonable because they move 3.5 million residents to new districts. They form Latino/Hispanic "super-majority districts". This is gerrymandering in the worse possible way, and the people in the audience speaking for the S2 and T1Plans have not been told this.

I plead that you use reason, fairness and good judgment when looking at the 3 presented plans. As our Supervisors, you owe it to all residents of LA County to come to a reasonable 4 to 1 majority, not send this important matter of redistricting to 3 county officials who do not deal with specific problems in all communities like you do. If you decide to dodge your duties, please pass the information in this letter on to them, as I believe they will see clearly that the A3 Plan is fair to all, and is what the people prefer. Please be very careful because you are setting the stage to pit ethnic groups against one another.

I have pointed out that the A3 Plan does conform and allows not only 2 Latino/Hispanic districts with more ethnic voters than any other group, but also a third district. The A3 Plan meets the criteria that the District 1 and District 2 Supervisors have requested, so it should be amenable to all five Supervisors.
