### **Ad Hoc Working Group Process**

The members of the Ad Hoc Working Group modifying Map F-1 (posted as OP 66) were:

The Commissioners came prepared with completed worksheets of *specific* suggested changes and their reasoning. The Commissioners used a round-robin approach to be efficient and fair to all Commissioners' input, following this process:

1. Commissioner suggested a change to assigned draft map options (Option B-1 or Option F).
2. Thai V. Le made the changes to the assigned draft map option via redistricting mapping software.
3. All other attending Commissioners raised their hands to provide questions, comments, support, or opposition.
4. The Commissioner making suggested changes responded to questions and concerns, then made any adjusted recommendations to the original suggestion.
5. If there is a consensus, Thai V. Le proceeded to make changes to draft map options via redistricting mapping software.
6. Gayla Kraetsch Hartsough recorded changes made and the reasoning for the changes in a shared document.
7. If there is not a consensus, the Ad Hoc Working Group moved to the next Commissioner's suggestion.

## Concepts and Overall Observations Discussed

The Ad Hoc Working Group for Map F built on the Commissioners’ adjustments made to Map F at the special meeting on November 22, 2021. They first created a version of Map F as OP 65, which contained minor changes – many addressing split cities and unincorporated areas.

This next modification to Map F is OP 66, which builds on the modifications made to OP 65, and makes more extensive changes, primarily of extending SD 2 to include beach communities to the west.

3	Torrance to SD 2	Population balancing while preserving COIs; keeping Torrance whole
4	Combine Westwood and Santa Monica with SD 3	Similar COIs; population balancing while preserving neighboring COIs, including breadth of UCLA sites between Westwood and Santa Monica
5	Unsplit; move Wholesale District into SD 1	Population balancing while preserving neighboring COIs
6	Move Pico Rivera to SD 1	Similar neighboring COIs
7	Move Wilshire Center to SD 3	Population balancing while preserving neighboring COIs
8	Move Rancho Park to SD 3	Similar neighboring COIs; population balancing while preserving neighboring COIs
9	Move Rancho Park, Mar Vista, Park La Brea, Miracle Mile, Sycamore Square to SD 1	Population balancing while preserving neighboring COIs near Wilshire Boulevard corridor, Century City, and western LA
10	Move Sun Valley, Sylmar to SD 1; move to SD 1	Population balancing while preserving neighboring COIs; similar equestrian or semi-rural lifestyles along the 210
